Alicia. "To decide that things are so desperate where you live that you are willing to send your 6, 7, 8 year-old in the hands of a stranger ... across a desert not knowing what waits on the other side. That is an act of sheer desperation that any mother, any father, can only imagine." Yet the issue of family reunification remains what Alicia calls "the most contentious and problematic part of the debate."

She calls the need for immigration reform "an American issue, a major American challenge" that has not been comprehensively addressed since

1965. The shaky U.S. economy and job market have compounded the problem. "There's a fear that people won't be able to give their kids what they had," Alicia noted. And with 11.5 million on a path to citizenship, there's also the question of "Who will they vote for?"

Work opportunities are what lure immigrants to the U.S. "We tell people don't come, but then we hang out a help wanted sign. It's a mixed message." She said, "We have American businesses that are knowingly soliciting and then hiring undocumented workers. That's the reality of what is pulling people across the border."

The speakers agreed that there is a need to prepare communities with the skills to accept immigrants. Commenting on Neighbors Link's efforts towards healthy integration, Barbara said, "Our hats are off to you ... the work you do is meaningful and inspiring to all of us."

Barbara and Alicia spoke at Old Oaks Country Club in Purchase, New York before a group of about 200 attendees. Two Neighbors Link clients, Maria Lopez and Gilma Acosta, echoed how valuable the organization's programs have been in their assimilation to their new home.

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

Network Pioneers Discuss the New Face of America and the Media

ccepting diversity is important for all the right reasons. It's also good business," said Barbara Fedida at the recent Latin Links presentation and luncheon organized by the Friends of Neighbors Link on the topic of "Women, the Immigrant Experience, and the Media." Barbara is Senior Vice President at ABC News, responsible for hiring and development of their on and off-air talent worldwide.

She was joined by Alicia Menendez, anchor of "Alicia Menendez Tonight" on Fusion, a news, pop culture and satire TV and digital network launched in 2013 by ABC-Disney and differences among people, using Univision. Menendez' brand of smart, a dynamic mix of digital media, witty news analysis attracts 18-29 year-old millennials including second and third generation acculturated Latinos to the quickly growing Fusion network. The cable channel is young and vibrant, broadcasts out of Miami, and only in English

"This is America now," said Barbara. She noted that there are 11.5 million undocumented immigrants currently living in the U.S. By the year 2030 one in four Americans will be Hispanic, a major consumer and voting segment. "Alicia has been able to remove a lot of the stereotypes," said Barbara.

Of Cuban heritage, Alicia Menendez was raised in the vibrant immigrant town of Union City, New Jersey. "Growing up, there were no Latinas on TV that looked like me," she said. Born in 1983 and graduated from Harvard in 2005, Alicia describes herself as an old millennial, the generation born into one of the worst economies and job markets ever, but "still so optimistic."



To connect with Alicia's generation of viewers, Fusion focuses on the "commonality" rather than the storytelling and analysis. To humanize the reality of the 11.5 million, Alicia said, "I believe in the power of stories." She and Barbara shared two poignant video segments about the hardships and failures of border crossings. "Telling a story about a person is different than telling a story about an issue," acknowledged Barbara.

Stories have been helpful in clarifying the phenomenon of the child migrant crisis. "Think about what that is like for a mom," said Continued on page 5
