Volunteers Teach from the Heart

hrough the doors of Neighbors Link, more recent immigrants than ever before come to find work, someone to talk with, and a place to learn and improve themselves. It's in this time of need for so many that the dedicated adult and teen volunteers of Neighbors Link truly shine.

Every Thursday evening, adult community members come to Neighbors Link to work with learners in small group ESL (English as a Second Language) tutoring sessions. Led by Joaquim Mendez, a trained Westchester Community College ESL instructor, Neighbors Link staff member Luisa Granda, and student volunteer Caryn Laska, the program attracts about 50 learners each week. Some of our adult tutors, Bob Schmidt, Nancy and Chris Kearin, and Robin Capaccio, have been volunteering at Neighbors Link for many years and have established valuable mentoring

relationships with their students.

Sarita Roy is a social worker and one of many Neighbors Link volunteers essential to the success of its English language program. "Our learners are desperate to learn the

English language. If they want work or to navigate this culture, they know they need to learn to speak English. I see real determination."

In addition to the more structured ESL courses taught professionally

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at Neighbors Link through Westchester Community College, volunteers like Sarita conduct a variety of small group ESL classes, tutoring sessions and informal conversation groups virtually every day of the week.

Together with co-coordinator and Neighbors Link





board member Mary Weiss, Sarita mentors a teaching program Tuesday evenings in which high school students tutor learners



in English. The Tuesday evening tutoring program, initiated by Horace Greeley as part of their Casa de Lengua Club, now also includes teens from local high schools like Fox Lane, Byram Hills, Yorktown and John Jay. Sarita also hosts her own class of learners on Thursday afternoons.

These volunteer-taught programs are part of a continuum of classes offered on a drop-in basis to accommodate the fluctuating schedules of the learners, over 300 of whom come to Neighbors Link to participate. Each English learner has a permanent folder that records their progress through the program and allows them to be placed according to proficiency. "Once learners are assigned to their groups, they get so

focused. It is an inspiring thing to see," observes Sarita.

Tutors use games and white boards to make learning English fun and interactive for the native Spanish speakers. Finding new teaching strategies and keeping things interesting is a "wonderful, constant challenge," said Sarita.

She finds the youth volunteers to be hard-working and compassionate, and she is touched to see the relationships that form between the teens and their adult students. By learning how to teach and how to connect with others, she feels the teens are benefitting as much as their students.

Seventeen year-old Caryn Laska is one such teen. In the three years she has been volunteering at Neighbors Link, Caryn has made herself indispensable. She began as an English tutor and now also acts as administrative coordinator for the Thursday adult volunteer ESL program as well as Family Night, a biweekly social and educational group for immigrant families. She independently coordinates with dozens of volunteers to provide scheduling coverage for these two programs.

According to Caryn, the Neighbors Link strategy to 'Educate, Empower and Employ' doesn't just apply to

the organization's Latino clients. "I have been educated and empowered to handle this job at such a young age." Giving her this opportunity, she said, is in line with the organization's culture. "It doesn't matter what age you are here. You are respected for what you are capable of."

Eleventh grader Sam Heffernan is a volunteer project leader from Hackley School, where he says "community service is a big part of our education." Sam and the other Hackley student leaders coordinate teen volunteers and help teach small conversation groups at Neighbors Link on Sunday mornings. While the Sunday program was initiated and is managed by Hackley School students, it also has the support of volunteers attending Fox Lane High School, Westchester Community College and other nearby schools.

At first, Sam thought it would be intimidating to teach adults. But it didn't take him long to see, "They're

Learning Links Volunteers Help Children Bridge the Gap

Across town at Mount Kisco Elementary School, longtime Neighbors Link volunteer and recently hired staff member Rebecca Jamo is making a difference. Joining Grace Postigliano, Rebecca helps keep things running smoothly for the 40 grade school-aged children who participate in the Learning Links program. Now in its second successful year, Learning Links was initiated by Neighbors Link in response to an overwhelming community need for an after-school program.

Rebecca was recruited for the key position of cocoordinator while volunteering as a Neighbors Link ESL tutor. "This is something I can do to help people since my parents were immigrants also," she said. "It would have been beneficial if there were a place like Neighbors Link around for them." Grace Postigliano, co-coordinator and the person who first had the vision for this program, knows the families of Mount Kisco Elementary School well and is able to tailor

Learning Links' services to the children's individual needs.

So each weekday at three o'clock, Rebecca and Grace begin their workday at Learning Links. They have seen firsthand how these children of low-income families thrive with the opportunity to participate in enrichment activities and receive curriculum-based tutorial and homework help.

According to the elementary administrators and teachers, Learning Links is helping to close the educational achievement gap. In addition to homework tutoring, the program teaches children "how to pay attention, be more outspoken, not afraid

of raising their hand, and how to get along better with their classmates," observes Rebecca.

Rebecca also coordinates the high school and adult volunteers who assist the Learning Links teachers. More than 30 teen and adult volunteers provide invaluable assistance to the Learning Links teachers, including helping the children with their homework.

The Horace Greeley student volunteers—who have formed a Learning Links Club at the high school—are key to the success of the program. Club presidents Noah Sheinbaum, Hillary Weinberg, Jacob Ward and Mary Ross coordinate the daily logistics for student volunteers and are responsible for scheduling and communications. Students from other area schools also volunteer in this program and are always welcome.

Funded through Neighbors Link and modest slidingscale tuitions, Learning Links' enrollment has exceeded expectations and there is a long waiting list for the fall.

"For me it's not a job. It's a place to come in and have fun with the children," said Rebecca. "Even though it's only for a couple of hours a day, I couldn't be without them."

Additional Programs and Classes at **Neighbors Link**

With a clear mission to help Educate, Empower, and Employ new immigrants, the following economic development and adult education programs are offered at Neighbors Link.

These programs are in addition to case management for issues impacting personal and family development, including medical and mental health, housing and homelessness, domestic violence, alcohol and drug dependency and other issues critical to the stabilization and development of healthy individuals and families. WestCOP Mount Kisco Head Start preschool is housed at Neighbors Link and is directed by Linda Bremner. Our Learning Links after-school program in partnership with Mount Kisco Elementary School is coordinated by Grace Postigliano and Rebecca Jamo.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND ADULT EDUCATION:

Job English

Morning classes for day laborers, Monday through Saturday 9am— 12noon. Taught by Westchester Community College and Neighbors Link volunteers. By learning "Job English" students increase employment opportunities and often graduate to other ESL classes at Neighbors Link.

ESL Classes

Monday through Friday evenings. Taught by Westchester Community College and Neighbors Link volunteers. ESL students are typically employed and possess 3-6 years prior schooling, with varying levels of English proficiency. Note: Children's Program offered during ESL classes.

Worker Center

Day workers assemble at 7am for jobs, using a lottery system for fairness created by the day workers themselves. Homeowners and Contractors may also choose workers without using the lottery system, based on need for special skills and/or English abilities, etc. Over 6,000 jobs negotiated annually. Note: Workers may attend morning English classes while waiting to be hired.

Job Bank

A referral service typically conducted by telephone, connecting homeowners and business owners to housekeepers, restaurant employees, masons, carpenters, painters, etc.

Management Apprenticeships

A participatory training program which teaches business management procedures applicable to local establishments such as restaurants, warehouse distributors, landscape nurseries, etc. Training includes cash receipts and disbursements, inventory management, and bank deposit preparation.

Learning Links Children's After-School Program

This after-school enrichment program provides homework and tutorial help to low-income children in grades K-5. Located at Mount Kisco Elementary

Computer Classes

Tuesday and Thursday 7-9pm. Evening classes in small group sessions, offering personalized instruction in basic computer skills. Note: Children's Program offered during classes.

Latin Sol Workshop

Tuesday and Thursday 7-9pm. Sewing and Craft Workshop offered for students wanting practical experience under professional supervision. Training is also provided to help students track inventory and analyze home business costs. Note: Children's Program offered during Workshop.

Community members and

friends: Please call us to find out how our workshop members can give personal attention to your basic alteration jobs.

Family Night

Friday night program for Family Learning and Socialization. Family Night features pot-luck meals and educational seminars on healthy marriage dynamics, child development, household budgeting, school support, job networking and community building. Focus is marriage and family life. Note: Children's Program offered on Family Nights.

Neighbors Link Café

Open 15 hours daily, 365 days a year, the supervised Café provides alcohol free socialization and community building with table games and recreation. With refreshments sold below market prices, the Café produces significant income to help offset the annual operating expenses of Neighbors Link.

Additionally, Neighbors Link offers a free Legal Clinic for constituents needing help with unpaid wages and general immigration issues as well as a Health Care Clinic offering health screenings.
