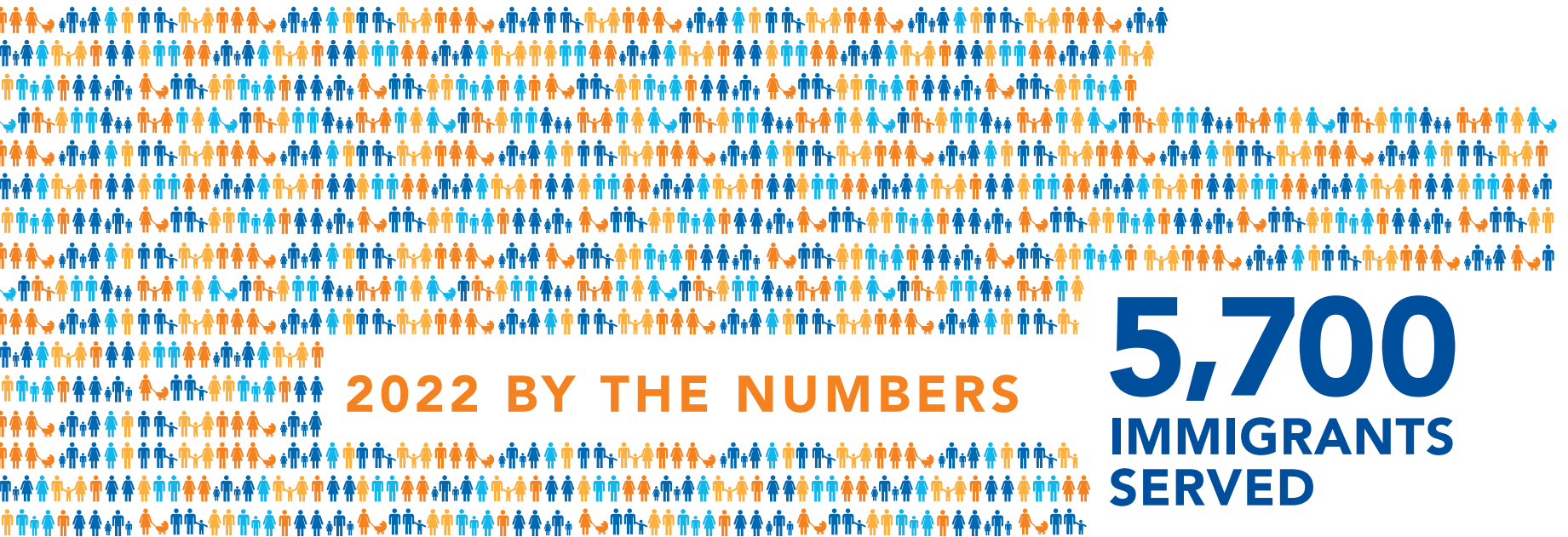

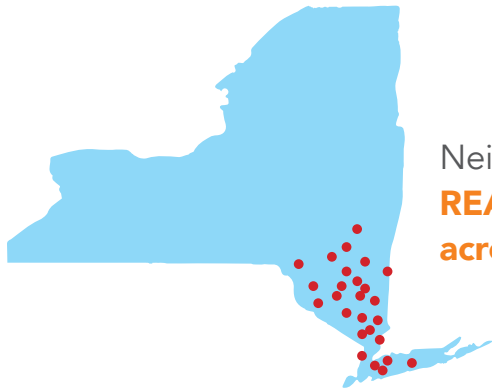

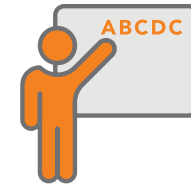
2022 By The Numbers

Neighbors Link works to build stronger communities through immigrant empowerment and integration. Our crucial programs include English classes, programs for parents and children, early childhood programs and academic support for school-age children, workforce development, immigration legal services, crisis support services, advocacy and more. Key to Neighbors Link's work is creating a shared forum for engagement between new Americans and longer-term residents through volunteerism, cultural awareness training, and civic advocacy.





Neighbors Link has **WIDE GEOGRAPHIC REACH**, with clients in over **100 towns** across **11 counties** in New York.



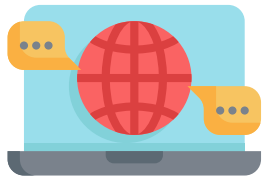
MORE THAN 700 ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS took part in virtual or in-person classes.



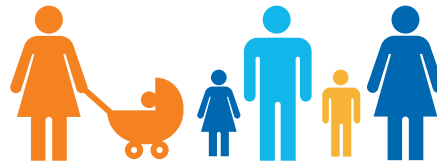
More than **550 volunteers** donated over **11,000 HOURS** to make our work possible.

Neighbors Link reached over **8,000 RESIDENTS WITH COMMUNITY EDUCATION TRAININGS** on topics such as Knowing Your Rights, Cultural Awareness, legal clinics and immigration updates.



WELCOMING NEW ARRIVALS AND CREATING STRONGER COMMUNITIES FOR ALL RESIDENTS

During the past year, we have seen many new arrivals from the Southern border being bussed into New York City and more recently, the Hudson Valley. Neighbors Link has been coordinating very closely with a variety of government agencies and community partners to support new arrivals.

Many of these immigrants are individuals and families who are fleeing violence and persecution, not unlike the immigrants of the 19th and 20th centuries.

This increase in new arrivals could be an important economic boon to New York State. New York is experiencing labor shortages in several key industries and immigration could be key in recovering the labor force and tax base. Unfortunately, asylum seekers are currently required to wait at least 150 days after filing an asylum claim before they can apply for work authorization. Neighbors Link has joined with local and national officials in advocating for expedited work permits for asylum seekers.

For centuries, people have immigrated to New York to build new lives for their families and to integrate into the vibrant communities we have around the state. We have the opportunity now to build welcoming communities where new arrivals can integrate quickly and contribute economically, socially and culturally to their new homes.

THE HUDSON VALLEY IS DEALING WITH A SHRINKING LABOR POOL, FEWER BIRTHS AND OUTWARD MIGRATION.



Currently the pool of older workers aged 45-64 is significantly higher than the pool of younger workers aged 25-44, and this trend is only likely to get worse.

Carreras y Caminos/ Careers and Pathways: Working Toward Economic Mobility

Neighbors Link's newest department, Carreras y Caminos / Careers and Pathways, offers new workforce training programs, a business center for community use, support for entrepreneurship, career counseling and a large number of digital literacy classes. The overall goal is to support immigrants, regardless of citizenship status, to access work and career options for economic mobility. This project will provide programming across Westchester County and we expect to serve up to 1,000 clients each year.

Sophia

I was born in Peru but have lived in New York for decades. I have a son, daughter and grandson who live with me and I also take care of my father who is 98 years old. I started attending digital literacy classes at Neighbors Link in Mount Kisco in 2022. By March 2023 I felt confident enough to ask if I could be a Teaching Assistant (TA) during Monday and Tuesday night classes. I have been volunteering with Neighbors Link ever since. Helping others is a form of therapy for me - being patient, sharing what I've learned, how I continue to learn and gaining community is wonderful. In some classes we feel like a family. We share stories, food and useful information. This experience has been so good for my general health. ●

Leadership Council: Learning Together, Demanding Action and Fighting for Just Immigration Policies

Neighbors Link has three Client Leadership Councils

composed of groups of 15-20 client volunteers from the immigrant community. The Council members initiate open conversations about issues that are important to the immigrant community, determine efforts for community outreach such as tabling events and distributing program information, discuss advocacy efforts and provide guidance and feedback on programs and services. A number of Council members have also attended marches and rallies for legislative and policy actions. The main goal for the Councils is to empower members of the immigrant community and honor their entrepreneurial spirit, ingenuity, creativity and grit. Their insights and contributions as volunteers to our work are significant and they play a key role in strategizing, prioritizing and implementing our work plans and advocacy.



Martha

I was born in Paraguay and came to New York in 2018. I first became involved with Neighbors Link when I brought my children to the Adelante Juntos program. I immediately loved the classes and how they helped my kids interact with other children. I also took the Eco-cleaning training program and then became involved in the leadership council.

In the leadership council, I have learned a lot about the needs of people in my community and I am motivated by knowing that I can do something to help. When we have knowledge of our rights and responsibilities, we have to use that knowledge, learn more, demand action and fight for what is right. I have always been very interested in the issue of social justice. In my country, I saw the needs of people, but it was hard to advocate for change. Here, I have the opportunity to get involved.

I have learned about the citizenship process, legislative policies and how we can participate in our towns and represent our communities. I have been active with campaigns like Coverage for All, because I believe we should all have the right to access medical services. I want to continue this work and share all the information I have learned with my community.

I believe that education is the only way to change our realities. Education is not easy but I can see from experience that Neighbors Link does that with the community. It inspires me to BE that neighbor who helps others. ●

English Language Education Providing the Foundation for Social Inclusion

Neighbors Link offers a variety of English language programs to meet the diverse needs of learners. We average 20 English language classes per week and of those, 55% are in-person and 45% are online. We are also seeing a steep increase in the demand for our English language classes. In 2021, we served 473 unique ESOL learners. In 2022, that increased to 713. In 2023, we are on track to serve more than 1,500 learners.

I have been attending the English classes at Neighbors Link in Yonkers for the past year. I have benefited greatly from this program. I am learning English and technology skills from the teachers here. ●

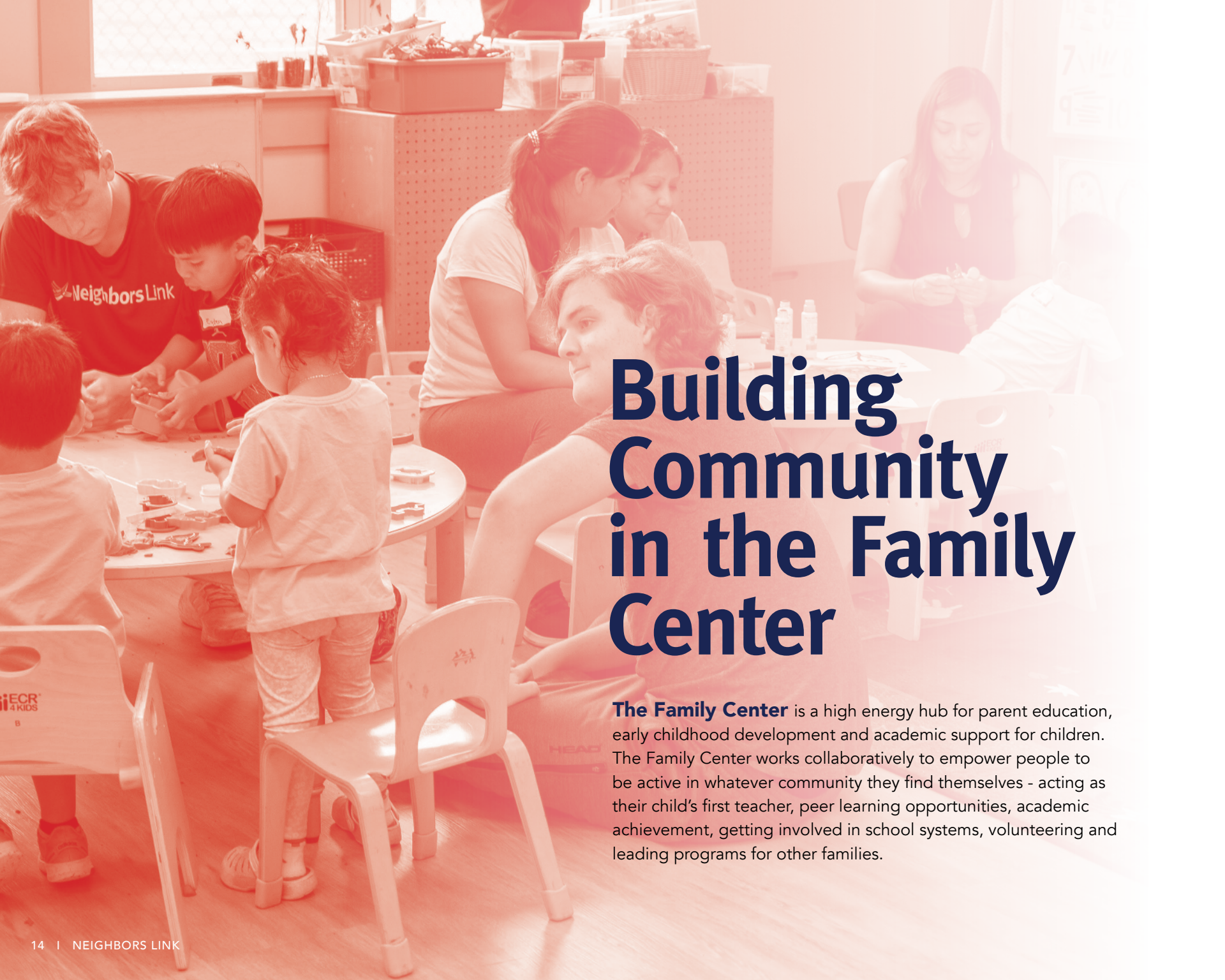

The Family Center is a high energy hub for parent education, early childhood development and academic support for children. The Family Center works collaboratively to empower people to be active in whatever community they find themselves - acting as their child's first teacher, peer learning opportunities, academic achievement, getting involved in school systems, volunteering and leading programs for other families.

Maria Isabel

I was born in Colombia and came to Mount Kisco in 2004.

At home, I had a Masters degree in Psychology and had worked for many years, but I wanted to give my children the best life and opportunities that I could.

In 2009, I began attending ESL classes at Neighbors Link and soon after, I started attending Adelante Juntos classes with my daughter. I also started volunteering my time with several programs.

The Family Center director noticed that I enjoyed the classes and was good at getting other participants engaged and involved, so she suggested that I join the Leadership Council. I appreciated being able to share my skills and helping lead more events and programs.

In 2015, I became a staff member at Neighbors Link. Currently, as the Parent Education Program Manager, I coordinate our Adelante Juntos programs at all three locations and work on many aspects of our programming in the Family Center.

For me, I have come full circle. I gained so much knowledge when I began attending classes at Neighbors Link nearly 15 years ago. In the years since, I have grown as a leader and I am grateful to be able to empower others to gain the skills and knowledge they need to be advocates for themselves and their families. I love this work. ●

Reka

Over the past few years, I have had the opportunity to volunteer in several capacities at Neighbors Link, from doing research to support the grant writing team, to helping with food distribution and vaccine clinics during COVID, to my initial and current volunteer work in the Adelante Juntos program for parents and their 4-year-olds. This program works to help prepare parents and their children for the start of kindergarten. You can see clearly that kids are coming in with parents who have an array of backgrounds, and varying educational experiences themselves, but with a common thread of parents and other family members who are committed to working to learn the best ways they can support their kids.

As the child of immigrants from Hungary, it was always clear to me that we don't choose where we are born. Any of us could have been born under very different circumstances, and I am very aware that my place of birth impacted my life and the opportunities I have.

For me, the biggest benefit of volunteering is being reminded that we may have different backgrounds and lived experiences, but we are one community. When one person has the opportunity to improve their life, our entire community benefits. Neighbors Link does an amazing job of connecting people to each other and helping us all recognize and value each other's humanity. ●

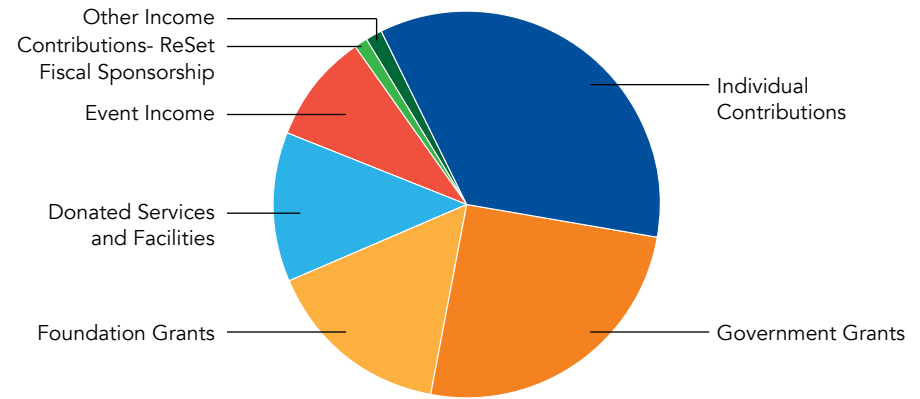

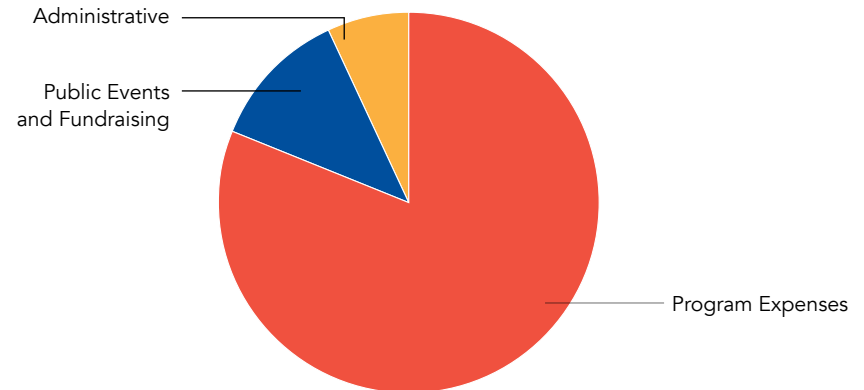
